Apparently, in Kuala Lumpur, we need more malls, hotels and luxury condominiums.

In San Francisco, an old strip used by the postal air service has been turned into a park. How did I know that? Because there is a small stone plaque to commemorate its existence.

Mark my words, the old Royal Malaysian Air Force base in Sungai Besi will be turned into yet another area filled with shopping malls, hotels and luxury condominiums.

And once this happens, future generations will never know that it once housed the first international airport. Another historical site consigned to the dust.

There is a need to remember and dignify history. This should not be just a government campaign but should be a voluntary effort by everyone. If not, we will be like those who forget history and are destined to repeat it. It is already happening.

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




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
